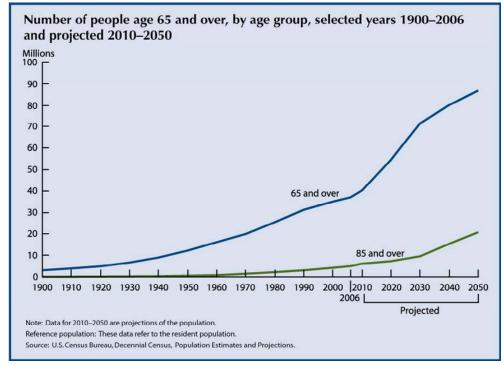


Figure 1. Number of Older Americans: 1900-2050.

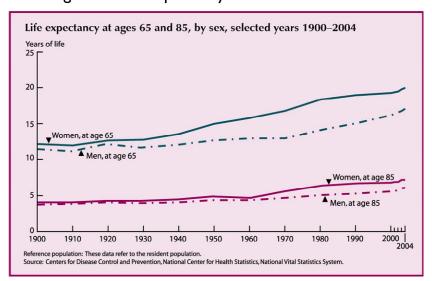
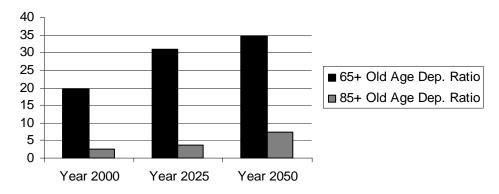


Figure 2. Life Expectancy in men and women over 65.

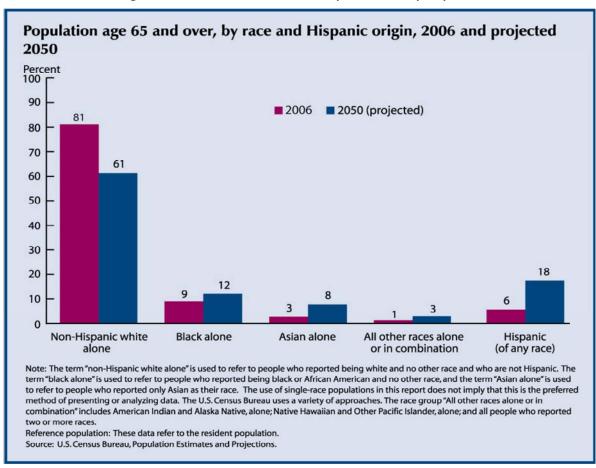


Figure 3. Old Age Dependency Ratio: U.S. Census Middle Series Projections.

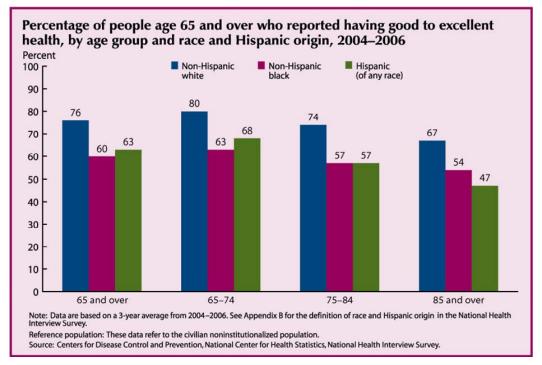
Figure 4. Racial and ethnic composition of people over 65.

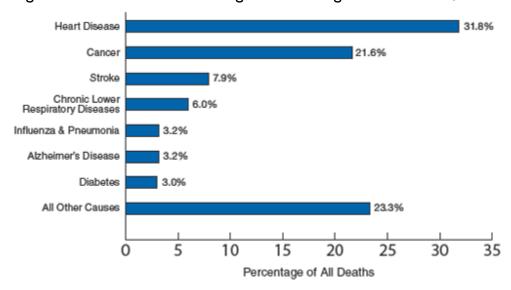

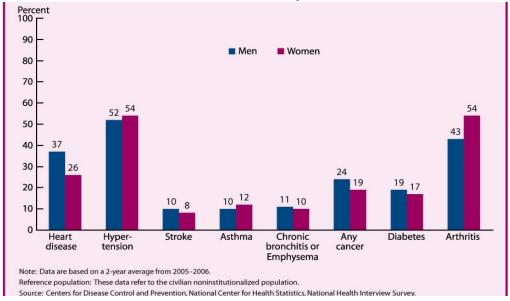
Figure 6. Causes of death among U.S. adults aged 65 and older, 2002.

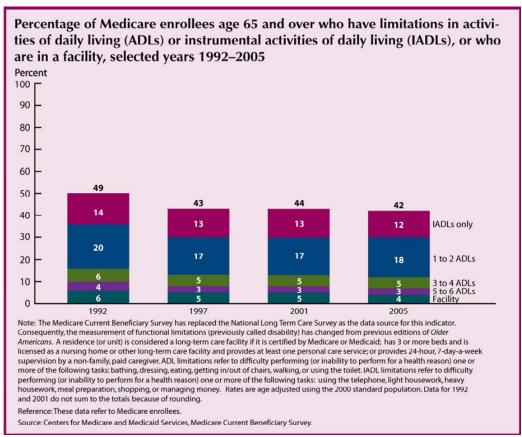


Figure 7. Percentage of people age 65 and over who reported having selected chronic conditions, by sex, 2005-2006.
