WELCOME TO THE 2017 APM CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAM!

We are pleased to support your social work licensure by offering continuing education credits (CEs) for eligible sessions at our APM!

CSWE is authorized as a CE provider through the Association of Social Work Boards (ASWB) Approved Continuing Education (ACE) program*. As an ACE provider, CSWE must meet the following requirements to offer CEs for APM sessions:

- An eligible CE session must last for one hour or more and include at least 50 minutes of uninterrupted instruction.
- The session must have clearly defined learning objectives.
- The CE recipient's attendance must be tracked to ensure their full participation in the session.
- The CE recipient must submit an evaluation before receiving credit.
- Credit may be awarded at one CE per hour of instruction.

For the 2017 APM, preconference workshops, interactive workshops, and panels meet these requirements. CE sessions are noted in the conference program by the CE icon:



You can maximize the number of credits earned by only attending sessions that offer CEs. A full schedule of CE sessions is listed in the following pages of this program guide as well as our website at https://www.cswe.org/Events-Meetings/2017-APM/Education/Continuing-Education.

Although ACE Provider CE credits are accepted by most U.S. state licensing boards, the final authority for approving any continuing education activity rests with the social work board of the state where you are licensed. You are responsible for ensuring that your state licensing board will accept the CEs you earn at APM.

*The Council on Social Work Education (CSWE), provider #1163, is approved as a provider for social work continuing education by the Association of Social Work Boards (ASWB), through the Approved Continuing Education (ACE) Program (approval period: 1/15/15–1/15/18).

CE PROCEDURES

1. REGISTRATION

APM attendees must select the Continuing Education (CEs) option on the APM registration form and pay a \$65 processing fee to participate in the program. If you have questions about the registration process or associated fees, please contact our registration company at apmregistration@spargoinc.com.

2. ATTENDANCE TRACKING

To comply with ASWB standards, CSWE must track session attendance for CE participants. At the 2018 APM, volunteers will electronically scan your conference badge as you enter and exit each session. To receive credit for your attendance, you must be present for at least 50 minutes of each hour of instruction. If you don't meet the minimum requirement for attendance for whatever reason (e.g. leaving early, arriving late), you won't be eligible to receive credit for that session. Likewise, if you are scanned in but not out of the session (or vice versa) you won't be eligible to receive credit for that session. Please attend closely to this requirement to ensure that you receive credit for each session you attend! There is very little we can do to accommodate inadequate proof of attendance.

3. WRITTEN EVALUATION

You must submit a written evaluation for each CE session you attend.

- a. Evaluation forms are available for download in the 2018 APM mobile app. Locate your CE session in the app and download the evaluation form under "Handouts". Alternatively, we have included all session evaluations on our website at https://www.cswe.org/Events-Meetings/2017-APM/Education/Continuing-Education/Written-Evaluation. Printed evaluations are not available on-site.
- b. Please ensure that you fill out the entire evaluation for each session you attend.
- c. You have three options for returning the evaluation forms to CSWE:

- d. The deadline to submit evaluations is Wednesday, January 31, 2018.
- e. CSWE staff will e-mail CE certificates within a month of receiving completed evaluations.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. I didn't register for CEs before attending the conference. Can I still receive credit?

You **must** register for CEs to participate in the program. This can be done prior to attending APM or you can register for CEs when you arrive on-site and check in at registration. You will not be eligible to receive credit after the conference if you have not registered for the program.

2. I have been to other conferences where I received CEs for every session I attended. Why can't I get credit for every APM session I attend?

CSWE is authorized as a CE provider by the Association of Social Work Boards, which stipulates the requirements a session format must meet to be eligible for CEs. These stipulations include things like length of continuous instruction, attendance tracking, etc. If an APM session format does not offer CEs, it is because it does not meet these requirements. Organizations that are not authorized by ASWB may be subject to different eligibility requirements.

3. Will my state licensing board accept the CEs I earn at APM?

CE participants are responsible for checking with their state licensing board to see if they will accept CEs earned at APM. Each state has different standards, and we cannot provide information about your situation. You can locate your state licensing board by visiting https://www.aswb.org/public/look-up-a-license/.

4. My state licensing board doesn't accept CEs from CSWE. What can I do?

Unfortunately, there is nothing we can do in this case. For this reason, please contact your state licensing board **prior** to attending APM to learn more about their requirements.

5. Why do I have to be scanned in and out of every session?

CSWE is authorized as a CE provider by the Association of Social Work Boards, which stipulates that we must track the attendance of each CE participant to ensure that they attend <u>at least</u> 50 minutes of each hour of instruction. The scanning process is more convenient for attendees and less intrusive to presenters than a written sign-in sheet.

6. What do I do if no one is available to scan me in or out of a session?

First, please be sure that the session you are attending offers CEs. We do not scan attendees in and out of non-CE sessions. After confirming that the session does offer CEs, notify a CSWE volunteer or staff person immediately. If you can't find someone outside of your session room, please go to the registration desk.

7. When will I receive my certificate?

We will e-mail CE certificates within one month of receiving your completed evaluations. The deadline to submit evaluations is January 31, 2018.
