# **Film Descriptions**

Beyond the Invisible: Living With Brain Injury (30 min)

**Brain Injury Association of New York State** 

This documentary recounts the personal experiences of three New York veterans who sustained a brain injury during Operation Iraqi Freedom.

# Coming Home: Families, Courage, and Resilience After Brain Injury (28 min)

Brain Injury Association of New York State

This follow-up to *Beyond the Invisible* focuses on the ways that traumatic brain injury has changed the lives of veterans and their families.

## Giota's Journey (47 min)

This intimate portrait of a 48-year-old woman with cerebral palsy who communicates through eye movements and facial gestures explores her relationships with family and caregivers, her dreams of love and travel, and the poetry of her eyes and words.



## I Won't Go (28 min)

John Huston's long-suppressed Signal Corps documentary from 1946 explores the posttraumatic stress disorder experienced by African American and White veterans of World War II. The film, newly restored by the National Archives and the National Film Preservation Foundation, is narrated by Huston's actor father Walter.
