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Quick Takes

THE ANNUAL SURVEY of Social Work Programs (Annual Survey) is a census of social work programs in the United States and its territories conducted by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) since 1952. Data collected in the Annual Survey are the primary source of information about social work students, graduates, and faculty.

Baccalaureate Highlights

- The majority of baccalaureate students were enrolled full-time in 2019. Of the 450 baccalaureate programs responding to this question, 87.2% of the 56,530 enrolled baccalaureate students were full-time. Baccalaureate programs had average enrollment of 126 total students.
- Over the last 10 years total enrollment in baccalaureate programs has increased by 12.6% at institutions reporting data in both 2009 and 2019, and increased by 0.9% in the last year. However, enrollment declined by 5.4% over the last 5 years. Enrollment of students taking courses part-time decreased dramatically over the 5-year period, dropping 17.7%. The number of accredited baccalaureate programs increased 3.6% over the last year, 8.6% over the last 5 years, and 15.8% over the last 10 years.
- The majority of baccalaureate social work students were female (85.8%) and younger than 25 (64.4%). African American/Black (non-Hispanic) students made up 22.6% of the enrolled students, whereas 48.7% were White (non-Hispanic) and 17.0% were Hispanic/Latinx.
- The 469 programs that responded conferred 18,769 baccalaureate degrees, an average of 40 per program. Degree conferrals outpaced enrollment over the 5-year and 10-year periods studied, with a 38.2% increase in conferrals over the last 10 years and a 6.8% increase over the last 5 years, but conferrals have declined by 1.1% in the last year.

Master's Highlights

• More than a third of master's students were enrolled part-time in 2019. Of the 226 master's programs responding to this question, 65.9% of the 68,793

enrolled master's students were full-time. Master's programs had average enrollment of 304 total students.

- Master's enrollment and the number of master's programs have increased annually over the last 10 years at institutions reporting data in both 2009 and 2019, with enrollment increasing 3.6% over the last year, 15.2% over the last 5 years, and 34.9% over the last 10 years. The number of accredited master's programs increased at a faster pace: 9.2% over the last year, 27.5% over the last 5 years, and 50.0% over the last 10 years.
- The majority of master's social work students were female (85.6%) and 25 years old or older (71.8%). African American/Black (non-Hispanic) students were 20.1% of the enrolled students, whereas White (non-Hispanic) students were 50.2%, and Hispanic/Latinx students were 16.3%.
- The 236 master's programs that responded conferred 29,546 master's degrees, an average of 125 per program. **Degree conferrals increased at a pace consistent with enrollment over the time periods studied,** with a 9.2% increase over the last year, 22.1% increase over the last 5 years, and 50.7% increase over the last 10 years.

Practice Doctorate Highlights

- Almost two-thirds of all enrolled practice doctorate students are enrolled full-time. For the 13 practice doctorate programs responding to this question, 64.0% of the 1,536 enrolled practice doctorate students were full-time, with 69.1% of students actively taking coursework. Practice doctorate programs had average enrollment of 118 total students.
- Enrollment in practice doctorate programs and the number of institutions offering practice doctorate programs slowed dramatically from 2018 to 2019, as opposed to the previous years. Since 2015, the first year for which a large enough response rate exists, enrollment increased annually by 34.4% from 2015 to 2016, 50.3% from 2016 to 2017, and 67.2% from 2017 to 2018, but then decreased by 5.3% from 2018 to 2019, for programs reporting data in both years. When including all programs reporting data, the number of

enrolled students increased from 1,487 in 2018 to 1,536 in 2019. The number of programs has increased annually by 5.9% from 2018 to 2019, 41.7% from 2017 to 2018, 9.1% from 2016 to 2017, and 37.5% from 2015 to 2016.

- The majority of practice doctorate social work students were female (82.8%) and 35 years old or older (75.4%). African American/Black (non-Hispanic) students were 35.8% of the enrolled students, whereas White (non-Hispanic) students were 36.0%, and Hispanic/Latinx students were 10.5%.
- The 14 practice doctorate programs that responded conferred 243 practice doctorate degrees, an average of 17 graduates per program. Degree conferrals increased by 47.8% from 2017 to 2018 before skyrocketing 107.1% from 2018 to 2019.

Research Doctorate Highlights

- More than three-quarters of all enrolled research doctorate students are enrolled full-time. Of the 60 research doctorate programs responding to this question, 77.8% of the 1,885 enrolled research doctorate students were full-time, with 52.0% of all students actively taking coursework. Research doctorate programs had average enrollment of 29 total students.
- Research doctorate enrollment declined over the last 1, 5, and 10 years. Enrollment was down 8.9% between 2018 and 2019, fell 18.6% from 2014 to 2019, and dropped 24.5% from 2009 to 2019. Over the same period the number of research doctorate programs increased by 1.3%, 6.7%, and 12.7% over the last year, 5 years, and 10 years, respectively.
- Almost one quarter of enrolled research doctorate students were male (24.5%). Nearly three-quarters were between 25 years of age and 44 years of age (73.6%). African American/Black (non-Hispanic) students were 22.1% of the enrolled students, whereas White (non-Hispanic) students were 46.0%, and Hispanic/Latinx students were 11.6%.
- The 67 research doctorate programs that responded conferred 294 research doctorate degrees, an average of four graduates per program. Degree conferrals decreased by 6.6% from 2018 to 2019, 0.8% since 2014, and by 6.5% since 2009.
- Research doctorate graduates are primarily going into tenure-line faculty positions at CSWE-accredited programs (31.2% of graduates), postdoctoral fellowships (9.9%), nonacademic administrative positions (6.4%), non-

tenure-line faculty positions at CSWE-accredited institutions (5.1%), and nonacademic administrative positions (5.1%).

Additional Highlights

- The prevalence of online education varies greatly between degrees. Among practice doctorate programs, 78.6% had course delivery options that were at least partially online (64.3% offered entirely online program options) and 80.8%% of master's programs gave students the option of taking at least part of their coursework online (30.1% offered entirely online program options). In contrast, 54.8% of baccalaureate programs had course delivery options that were at least partially online (7.1% offered entirely online program options) and 11.6% of research doctorate programs gave students the option of taking at least part of their coursework online (4.3% offered entirely online program options).
- By Carnegie Classification, Doctoral Universities with very high research activity (R1) enrolled the highest percentage of social work students (28.5%) and conferred the highest percentage of social work degrees (31.7%) for all program levels. Large Master's Colleges and Universities (M1) enrolled the second highest percentage of social work students (23.6%) and conferred the second highest percentage of social work degrees (23.9%).
- Among all students enrolled, 24.0% were at Minority Serving Institutions, whereas 25.1% of all degrees were conferred at Minority Serving Institutions.
- Educational debt for baccalaureate and master's social work graduates is higher today than it was 10 years ago. Master's graduates have, on average, more than 50% more debt today; in 2019, the average loan debt amount was \$46,591, compared to \$30,789 in 2009. On average, baccalaureate graduates had \$29,323 in loan debt in 2019, compared to \$24,683 in 2009.

Faculty Data Highlights

• There were more than 5,600 full-time faculty members in social work programs in the United States as of fall 2019. Almost three-quarters were female (73.0%), 61.1% were White (non-Hispanic), 17.6% were African American/Black (non-Hispanic), and 6.8% were Hispanic/Latinx. Half of all full-time faculty members held research-focused doctorates in social work as their *highest earned degree* (50.1%). 90.6% held a master's degree in social work, and 51.0% held a license in social work.

- The average annual salary for assistant professors in social work programs was \$72,992, whereas it was \$85,261 for associate professors and \$111,951 for full professors.
- There were more than 7,800 part-time faculty members (which includes adjunct/term faculty and anyone who taught courses in the department who was not a full-time faculty member) in social work programs in the United States as of fall 2019. More than two-thirds were female (68.4%), 58.3% were White (non-Hispanic), 16.9% were African American/Black (non-Hispanic), and 8.2% were Hispanic/Latinx. More than two-thirds of all part-time faculty members held master's degrees in social work as their *highest earned degree* (69.2%). 90.4% held master's degrees in social work, and 63.3% held a license in social work.
- The average financial compensation per course for part-time faculty members with master's degrees was \$3,187 for baccalaureate classes, \$3,804 for master's classes, \$4,500 for practice doctorate classes, and \$3,940 for research doctorate classes. For part-time faculty members with research doctorate degrees, average compensation per course increased to \$3,537 for baccalaureate classes, \$4,019 for master's classes, and \$4,746 for research doctorate classes, but dropped to \$4,307 for practice doctorate courses.
- By program level, the percentage of all courses taught by part-time faculty members fluctuated from 56.5% of practice doctorate courses to 44.5% of master's courses, 32.8% of baccalaureate courses, and 11.7% of research doctorate courses.

Introduction

THE ANNUAL SURVEY of Social Work Programs (Annual Survey) is a census of social work programs in the United States and its territories conducted by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) since 1952. Data collected in the Annual Survey are the primary source of information about social work students. graduates, and faculty members. In addition to advancing knowledge about social work education, the data are used to determine program membership dues for accredited baccalaureate and master's programs.

Background

The 2019 Annual Survey was composed of five survey sections that gathered data on baccalaureate programs, master's programs, practice doctoral programs (e.g., DSW), research doctoral programs (e.g., PhD), and full- and part-time faculty and social work administrative staff members. The program sections included items on program structure and offerings, enrollments, and degrees awarded. The 2019 survey returned to a format that was closer to previous formats by collecting demographic data for enrolled students and graduates at all program levels and data on applications and first-time enrollment for practice doctoral and research doctoral programs. Please note that for all demographic data, the percentages reported are based on the number of responses to the question (because the questions were not required); the percentages do not directly correlate with the total number or students enrolled or the number of degrees conferred.

This year's report continued the 2018 addition of a trend analysis of enrollment and degrees conferred, by degree level, for periods of 1, 5, and

10 years. Trend data were calculated by comparing enrollment and degree conferral rates for programs that submitted data in both years of the comparison; data for institutions that submitted data in only one of the vears were excluded from the trend calculation. The trend calculation shows the percentage change in category between the two identified years. This year's report also greatly expanded the data collected about online education and the multiple ways that programs are incorporating online learning into their programs (note: data were collected prior to the COVID-19 pandemic).

The survey was administered online through the Qualtrics survey platform. Invitations to the survey were sent via e-mail on November 21, 2019, to all CSWE-accredited social work programs and to doctoral social work programs housed at institutions with CSWE-accredited social work programs. Data collection closed in February 2020. Response rates are found in Table 1. A full list of responding institutions can be found in Appendix A.

A copy of the complete survey instrument is available on the CSWE website. Any questions about this report or the Annual Survey may be addressed to research@cswe.org.

Respondents to the survey are required to respond to only a small percentage of items, most notably the number of degrees conferred, resulting in varied response rates per question. The data compiled in this report are based on self-reported data from the responding programs and institutions.



THE MAJORITY OF enrolled baccalaureate in social work students were female and younger than 25 years of age in 2019.













NEARLY HALF OF all graduates from baccalaureate social work programs are racial/ethnic minorities.



ACCREDITED INSTITUTIONS' DEGREE conferrals shrank over the last year, but have grown more quickly than enrollment over the last 5 and 10 years.





THE MAJORITY OF master's students were female and 25 years of age or older in 2019.




MASTER'S ENROLLMENT AND the number of master's programs has increased annually over the last 10 years.




GRADUATES FROM MASTER'S social work programs are almost evenly divided between White (non-Hispanic) and racial/ethnic minorities.



ANNUALLY OVER THE last 10 years, more master's degrees have been conferred year-over-year, keeping pace with the percentage increase in accredited programs.





























PERCENTAGE CHANGE IN DEGREES CONFERRED BY PROGRAM TYPE AND TIME PERIOD




PERCENTAGE CHANGE IN ENROLLMENT BY PROGRAM



MASTER'S DEGREE CONFERRALS have increased by more than half over the last 10 years, while baccalaureate degree conferrals increased by more than a third.




PERCENTAGE CHANGE IN DEGREES CONFERRED BY PROGRAM TYPE AND TIME PERIOD












